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SYNOPSIS

Five stories about love are interweaved in Oslo, during the hottest day if the year. A man lies dying in the street, surrounded by people who, on the contrary are more alive than ever.

For eleven years, Leon has been dreaming about turning 25. At the age of fourteen he and Aasa made a pact to meet again on this day to be together forever. Now he is frightened that she will not come, but maybe even more frightened that she actually will. The nurse Vidar tries to prevent his premonitions by keeping himself awake from his dreams. He is a night watch at the institution where Leon lives and has dreamt that Leon and Aasa will never meet. The people in Hawaii, Oslo cross each others paths and meet one another – like the streets in a city. Everyone is running from something, searching for something or dreaming of something else on this destined day.

Everyone is looking for love and finding companionship.

Directors Biography

Erik Poppe (1960) was educated as a cinematographer at the Dramatic Institute in Stockholm, Sweden. "Hawaii, Oslo" is the second part of his Oslo Trilogy, after his feature film debut with the award winning SCHPAAA (Bunch if Five). SCHOAAA received the grand prize at the Berlin IFF –Panorama section 1999, and the Vesuvio Prize at the Napoli International Film Festival, besides being picked up for several festivals in 1998 – 2000.

Erik Poppe worked as Director photography on EGGS, and was awarded with the Kodak Award at the Moscow IFF (1994) and won the Cinematographer of the year award in Norway in 1995.

He is one of Norway's most experienced directors and had won a number of international prizes for commercials and music videos, not to mention short and documentary films.

Directors Statement

I grew up having an aunt who lived in California. She always took her vacations in Hawaii, and we got her exotic and colorful postcards. Hawaii is an illusion about the ultimate, an island of love with Aloha, Floral wreaths and everything. But in reality, some parts of Hawaii are also some of the worst places on earth. A horrible bad trip! In the movie, the island Hawaii expresses the dreams and illusions we all have in us. Some people still dream of coming to Hawaii and as we all know, it's our dreams that give us strength and direction on life.

I wanted to make a film about hope and love. The desire to kiss the one you love, the need to call someone you like. This is the reaction I wished to create for the audience. Fighting for the three most difficult words and say: I love you. My own cry for love is in the movie, and it is not an exaggeration to say that I did the movie as an effect of this.
